Just as domestic animals show signs of depression if their environment does not fulfil their needs, wild animals will also suffer.

The travelling circus stops at a location for a short time, does a handful of performances, then moves on. Whilst being moved, the animals have to be in cramped conditions, and I don't suppose they find the driving motion. Being confined will be frightening to animals, who are used to coping with fear by fight or flight but unable to do so in this situation. Then they arrive at the next location. Is their confinement reduced - probably not, unless when they are in the circus ring rehearsing or performing counts - jokel Where can the animals be kept in order to maintain the safety of the public? A wildlife park, where the animals could have some element of freedom and opportunities for some natural behaviour cannot be towed behind a lorry, and set up next to the circus tent.
