TAIL DOCKING

Lines to take:

- Tail docking has been illegal in Scotland since 30 April 2007.
- At the time the Scottish Government stated that if in the future the ban compromised the overall welfare of working dogs then it would review the position.
- A public consultation launched on 10 February 2016 to seek views on the permitting limited tail docking. SGA was notified of the consultation and the Scottish Government encourages responses from all interested persons.

What is tail docking?

- Tail docking involves the removal of part of a puppy's tail, generally without anaesthetic. (It is not to be confused with medical treatment of an injured tail.)
- It is a very divisive topic. The Scottish Gamekeepers Association is in favour of

Is it legal in Scotland?

- No. It has been banned since 30 April 2007 under section 20 of the Animal Health and Welfare (Scotland) Act 2006 ("the 2006 Act").
- Persons convicted of tail docking face maximum penalties of 6 months imprisonment and or a fine of up to £5,000.
- Scottish Ministers have powers in the 2006 Act to vary the current ban, having first consulted.

Why is the Scottish Government consulting on this issue?

- Scottish Government committed to reviewing the position if, in the future, the ban compromised the welfare of working dogs.
- The Scottish Government commissioned, in 2011, research from the University of Glasgow on the incidence of tail injuries to working dogs.
- One of the research projects calculated that in one shooting season 57% of undocked spaniels and 39% of hunt point retrievers experience a tail injury of some sort; and that docking their tails by one third could significantly reduce the risk of injury.

What Does the Consultation Ask?

- Consultation seeks views on the proposal to:
 - Permit the docking, by up to a third in length, the tails of working Spaniels and Hunt Point Retrievers before they are more than 5 days old; and
 - Whether tail docking should be carried out by veterinary surgeons only; and only where the vet is satisfied that the dogs will be used for working purposes and the pain of docking is outweighed by possible avoidance of later more serious injury.

This e-mail also replies to **second second** s e-mail of 2 June 2016 about the consultation of working dogs (proposal to permit tail docking of working Spaniels and Hunt Point Retrievers).

Remit of the Consultation

The consultation was limited to a possible exemption to allow the docking of up to one third of the tail of spaniels and hunt point retriever puppies intended to go on to work, generally in the shooting industry. The limitations to these specific types of dogs were placed as a result of the former Cabinet Secretary's discussions with the Rural Affairs and Climate Change Committee in late 2015.

Legislative Basis for any Change

An exemption to the current ban on tail docking may be made on animal welfare grounds by affirmative secondary legislation, under powers contained in s.20(5) of the Animal Health and Welfare (Scotland) Act 2006. Any change is likely to be made to the Prohibited Procedures on Protected Animals (Exemptions)(Scotland) Regulations 2010.

Timing of Decision

The consultation elicited 914 responses and the decision was made, owing to the volume of replies, for an external analysis contract to be awarded. An invitation to tender was published through the Research Framework on 21 May 2016 but there were no bids for the contract.

The invitation to tender was reissued 31st May 2016 to a wider range of contractors and it is expected that the contract will be awarded on, or around, 11th July. The completed independent analysis report is expected to be available to the Cabinet Secretaries by 19th September; a decision and announcement would not be advisable until after this report has been considered.

Background

- The issue of tail docking in working dogs is both controversial and difficult, with strong views being held by those on both sides of the debate. All parties profess to have the welfare of dogs in mind.
- SG has always agreed that if evidence came to light that suggested the ban compromised the welfare of working dogs then We would review the current position.
- Research commissioned from the University of Glasgow was published in April 2014 that provided data on the incidence of tail injuries in working dogs.
- This was followed up by a consultation in 2016 designed to seek the views of all interested parties, and any evidence they can furrlish, on whether permitting to the docking of tails, of up to a third in length, will offer welfare benefits to working Spaniels and Hunt Point Retrievers.



Briefing on key issues



Top line

• The Scottish Government announced on 4 October 2016 that there would be a relaxation on the shortening of the tails of working dogs. Affirmative secondary legislation presented to the Scottish Parliament on 12 May 2017 for consideration and approval. Non-medical docking remains illegal in Scotland until the Scottish Parliament approves a change.

Background

- The issue of tail docking in working dogs is both controversial and difficult, with strong views being held by those on both sides of the debate. All parties profess to have the welfare of dogs in mind.
- SG has always agreed that if evidence came to light that suggested the ban compromised the welfare of working dogs then we would review the current position. Research commissioned from the University of Glasgow was published in April 2014 that provided data on the incidence of tail injuries in working dogs.
- Consultation in 2016 elicited 914 responses. Replies were polarised with 77% contributed by those involved in field sports 92% in favour of tail shortening.
- After external independent analysis of responses Scottish Ministers decided to permit the docking of tails, of up to a third in length, to offer welfare benefits to working Spaniels and Hunt Point Retrievers.
- Legislation will permit the shortening of the tails, by up to the end third of length, of working spaniels and hunt point retrievers. An additional safeguard will be that shortening will only be allowed where carried out by a veterinary surgeon that is of the professional opinion that a dog will be used for working and is likely to be at risk of serious tail injury in later life. Veterinary certification is to be provided within a format to be decided in discussion with RCVS.

Tail Docking

Top line

• The Scottish Government are considering the responses to the tail docking consultation along with other evidence and come to a decision over the next few months.

Background

- The issue of tail docking in working dogs is both controversial and difficult, with strong views being held by those on both sides of the debate. All parties profess to have the welfare of dogs in mind.
- SG has always agreed that if evidence came to light that suggested the ban compromised the welfare of working dogs then we would review the current position.
- Research commissioned from the University of Glasgow was published in April 2014 that provided data on the incidence of tail injuries in working dogs.
- This was followed up by a consultation in 2016 designed to seek the views of all interested parties, and any evidence they can furnish, on whether permitting to the docking of tails, of up to a third in length, will offer welfare benefits to working Spaniels and Hunt Point Retrievers.
