EU OMNIBUS REGULATION, MANDATORY AND OPTIONAL CHANGES AFFECTING CAP PILLAR 1 AND PILLAR 2

Purpose

1. To inform you of the changes that the recently published EU Omnibus Regulation require, or allow; and, seek your agreement on the changes to be introduced for 2018. You will wish to be aware of this in advance of the NFUS AGM.

Background

3. Proposals for CAP simplification were discussed in the EU throughout 2017. Through the Omnibus Regulation the European Commission (EC) has now published a range of mandatory and optional changes to the Regulation establishing rules for direct payment to farmers and the Scottish Rural Development Programme. In making these changes the EC are aiming at further simplifying the policy with a view to easing the burden on and making life easier for both farmers and national authorities. However the EU is yet to provide any further detailed information around the changes in the form of updated Implementing Regulations.

The changes that the Omnibus regulation brings.

- 4. The changes fall into four categories:
 - a) Mandatory
 - b) Optional and immediately deliverable/desirable
 - c) Optional but require more consideration
 - d) Not applicable to Scotland

5. The tables below give the (a) mandatory and (b) optional and immediately desirable changes. With regards to the mandatory changes that are relevant to Scotland these shall be implemented with as little burden or change to the farmer as possible.
