Our current practice in relation to free sanitary products is that the majority of schools have small stocks of free sanitary products, provided as promotional /education material from a number of different companies. These are issued to children and young people who require them in a variety of ways including collection from the school office, medical room, class teacher or guidance teacher.

As the products are free no cost is incurred.

#### **Proposal for August 2018**

After consulting with a number of schools and some young people we propose the following:

The local authority will bulk by a range of sanitary products.

These will be delivered to schools. The quantity delivered will be based around children and young people who stay in SIMD 1 and 2 and/or Free Meal Entitlement and staff knowledge of family circumstances.

Schools will be asked to set up systems which will allow children and young people to collect sanitary products as required in a sensitive and confidential manner. They will also be allowed to take products for using at home in the evening/week-end.

Costs at this time can only be estimated. We have used costs incurred during the North Ayrshire Pilot as a guide.

£750 per secondary (average) = £6000

£50 per primary (average) = £2050

£100 per special =£200







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and I met with CoSLA this afternoon to discuss delivery of the PfG commitment. We advised them that while Ministers favour a national delivery model this may be some years down the line and that local delivery would be the only way to deliver from August.

It was a very positive meeting, with CoSLA officials advising that their Board had welcomed the fact that SG was not limiting the offer to in-school hours in term-time and also that primary age girls were being included (pro-rata) in the funding calculations. They agreed that it was important for SG and CoSLA to work in partnership to make this work.

We agreed a way forward that aims to have greater clarity on delivery and budgets by the end of April. CoSLA are going to set up a meeting between officials and a couple of Directors of Finance/Heads of Service to talk about what might be a reasonable initial uptake figure to base funding on, recognising that uptake will increase as the offer becomes known and normalised. CoSLA's CYP Board meets on 13<sup>th</sup> April and we'd hope to gain endorsement from them for the approach, with the aim of putting a paper to the Settlement and Distribution Group when they meet around the end of April/start of May.

In discussion we made it clear that from our point of view it's vital to engage with, and communicate the guiding principles to, LAs so that they consider choice and dignity in their delivery and don't just go for what the market can currently offer easily (ie dispensers). CoSLA seemed comfortable with that.

We discussed the possible ways to deliver the out of school requirements – either local solutions or an interim national model. They felt that this may vary by LA as some may have very good partnerships with other agencies that would allow local delivery, but they are going to have some conversations and come back to us.



### **Guiding Principles**

### **Background**

 Programme for Government commitment: providing access to free sanitary products to students in schools, colleges and universities and considering further action to support those on low incomes in light of the findings of the current pilot scheme in Aberdeen

### **Guiding Principles**

The delivery model should be based on:

- Protecting students' dignity, avoiding anxiety, embarrassment and stigma
- Making a range of products and different qualities available, giving students
   choice about the products they want to use
- A response that is reflective of students' views and experiences
- An efficient and dignified approach which demonstrates value for money
- An offer for all eligible students throughout the year to include both term time and holidays
- Ensuring sanitary products are easily accessible to meet individual needs
- Individuals being able to get sufficient products to meet their needs
- Gender equality, ensuring anyone who menstruates can access products, including transgender men and non-binary individuals, and that language is gender neutral. The roll out of gender neutral toilets should also be taken account of.
- Awareness raising and education to both promote the 'offer' and change cultural norms

### Proposed Delivery approach

- Twin track approach with initial local models leading to opportunities through collaborative approaches to inform and develop longer term national models
- Funding in the first instance based on population and an amount per student per year
- Adopt a common evaluation framework to gather key data and information to inform on-going policy and delivery and refine costs
- Explore opportunities for wider benefits, e.g. through contracting

### **Eligibility**

• Students in SG-funded secondary schools, in secondary years in independent schools, and at colleges and universities. Provision should also be made for primary schools, with girls of primary age included in the funding calculations on a pro-rata basis (10% of 11 year olds, and 30% of 12 year olds)

### **Engagement activity with young people and students**

### 1. Aims

Young Scot are undertaking engagement activity with young people and students to inform the delivery of the commitment and ensure the guiding principles are in line with the views of those the policy will impact on.

This engagement aims to provide further information on the following main topics:

- what issues or circumstances can make accessing sanitary products difficult for young people and what impact lack of access to products has;
- how young people feel about discussing menstruation;
- how young people feel about receiving free sanitary products and what way/s of accessing products young people think would work best for them.

### 2. Methods

Young Scot are undertaking three different engagement activities to allow us to explore these topics:

- A short online survey to be carried out between December 22<sup>nd</sup> and end January.
- A "Dear... Letter" this method involves asking young people to write an anonymous letter to share their experiences and perceptions of a topic. Also to be carried out online between December 22<sup>nd</sup> and end January.
- Two focus group discussions with small groups of young people at school, and at college and university. These discussions will be held in February to allow us to explore findings emerging from the survey and letter in more detail.

### 3. Survey Questions cover the following issues:

- How comfortable respondents feel talking about or going to buy sanitary products
- Whether respondents have experienced difficulty accessing sanitary products, and the reasons for this
- The consequences arising from difficulty accessing sanitary products (e.g. having to use an alternative, missing school/college/university, feeling worried)
- Which delivery option respondents would prefer (e.g. free products in toilets or available from staff, a voucher or card to use in shops)

### 4. The "Dear periods" letter gave respondents prompts on the following topics:

- What words do you use to talk about periods/sanitary products?
- Your own positive and negative experiences of starting and managing your periods.

- Your perceptions/opinions about accessing free sanitary products for free how would you like to access products?
- Your relationship with your periods.

Members are asked to note the ongoing engagement activities and that SG will share the responses from their areas with Local Authorities when this is received from Young Scot. A summary report will also be published.

### PfG Commitment from August 2018 - Funding model

### 1. Eligible Population for Funding

### 1.1. Schools

The available data suggest that, very roughly, the average age of menarche is a little over 12; around 5-10% of girls will have started menstruating by age 11, around 20-30% will have started menstruating by age 12 and the majority (80-90%) will have started by age 14. Given the average age for menarche, a focus on secondary schools would target the vast majority of pupils who will be menstruating. However the working group indicated at its first meeting that there should be scope for partners to implement initiatives in primary schools.

Ministers have agreed therefore that the eligible population for the basis of calculating funding should include female pupils in state secondary schools, female pupils in the secondary years (aged 12 and over) in independent schools, and a prorata figure for girls aged 11 and 12 in primary schools. The pro-rata figure will be based on estimated numbers of 11 and 12 year old girls menstruating (around 10% for 11 year olds and 30% for 12 year olds), to ensure that they are appropriately represented in funding calculations and included in provision on a local basis.

### 1.2. Colleges and Universities

It is proposed that the eligible population for the basis of calculating funding for colleges and universities should include all female students at Scottish colleges and universities.

### 2. Per person costing by usage and unit cost

It is proposed that funding be awarded on the basis of the eligible population as set out above and based on an amount per student per academic year and estimates of uptake. The table below illustrates some different levels of product usages, and annual cost based on a range of retail unit prices.

It should be noted that as the above are retail costs products could also be procured directly at a lower cost, however more expensive options are also available. For instance we understand that some Local Authorities are paying up to 70p per product when procuring dispensers. We are concerned that this option does not currently represent value for money or sufficient choice.

Taking account of the figures in the table above, **SG estimate a reasonable figure** for full take up being 300 products per year, made up of:

- o an average of 4-5 products per day
- o a 5 day period (periods last on average 3 to 8 days) = 23 products per period
- 13 periods per year = 300 products

Based on average term time in schools, colleges and universities of 38 weeks, this would equate, on average, to:

- 10 menstrual cycles (~230 products) during term time and
- 3 menstrual cycles (~70 products) outwith term time

In coming to an agreed unit price the following will be noted:

- The unit price will include an element for administration/delivery costs
- The unit cost for a procured solution may be lower than retail costs
- The local delivery approach will impact on the actual coverage possible through the local budget – eg if the approach is delivery via procured dispensers at a rate of 70p per product, reach will be lower

Members are invited to note the basis on which SG are considering unit cost and discuss

### 3. Take-up rates

It is expected that, at least in the 2018-19 academic year, uptake may be low due to this being a new policy and the time required for the culture change to lessen the stigma around accessing products in this way. For the purposes of budget modelling it would be helpful to agree working assumptions on expected average uptake, accepting that in 2019-20 and onwards uptake would be expected to increase. It may be that some individuals access a very high proportion of their requirements through this provision, while others access it more sparingly.

It is clear that uptake may vary by institution and also by local authority level, and particularly for the latter we may wish to apply a variable element based on deprivation indicators.

Members are invited to discuss the best way forward to agree anticipated uptake figures on which to base funding for 2018-19 and future years

### PfG Commitment from August 2018 - Delivery

### 1. Local delivery approach from August

To meet the August 2018 commitment local delivery options will be required. SG wishes to work with relevant partners to ensure these meet the Guiding principles – in particular quality, choice and value for money.

This approach will allow further testing of demand and uptake, which in turn will inform any future national system. It should be noted that some localised provision of products is expected to continue to be a feature of delivery on an ongoing basis, as provision should be made for situations where an individual is 'caught out' and requires products urgently.

### 2. Role of National Procurement organisations

While it is welcomed that some organisations have taken the initiative and started to plan for delivery, for at least some these plans are being driven by what the market can offer, and there are concerns that making commitments to contracts for vending machines will not deliver on the guiding principles.

SG officials have met with colleagues from Scotland Excel to discuss the potential for alternatives to the existing procurement solutions that are available to Local Authorities and plan to meet with APUC (Advanced Procurement for Universities and Colleges) to have similar discussions. It is hoped that new National Frameworks can be developed to offer suitable alternatives to dispensing machines that meet the guiding principles, and that these can be in place in a timescale that allows delivery in the first term of the 2018-19 academic year.

The most appropriate routes for provision outwith term-time will also need to be carefully considered. This may vary across the sectors and while it may involve working with local partners *SG* also wish to explore the interest in national arrangements to provide out of hours/non term-time coverage (which may also provide term-time requirements if partners wish to go down that route). At this early stage of exploration it is anticipated this would be a national voucher or online ordering system. Over time these arrangements could convert to, or inform, a wider national system.

### The Group is invited to discuss:

- The value / benefits of national framework approach
- Interim arrangements if this cannot be in place by August
- Preferred options for delivery during weekends and holidays

### 3. Long term delivery approach

Ministers have indicated that they are keen to explore the feasibility of a national delivery model which may potentially involve the use of a payment or entitlement

card. Any such national delivery model must provide value for money, dignity and choice.

Initial indications from engagement with the retail sector identify that this may take 2-3 years to put in place due to complexities and scale and SG is continuing to explore this with relevant organisations, including the Improvement Service. We also intend to utilise the intelligence and experience gained from implementing new national frameworks to inform future plans.

### Members views on this approach are welcome

### 4. Engagement

Local partners have differing levels of awareness of the policy and SG recognise the need to promote the guiding principles with local authorities, colleges and universities. Discussions with some members of the group have identified upcoming opportunities for this including a meeting of those leading within individual colleges on this policy and a meeting with local authorities being arranged by Scotland Excel.

We also propose issuing a written briefing to local partners via national partners which communicates the guiding principles, planned engagement activities and expected outputs and the potential for alternative delivery routes to be made available via Frameworks.

Members are invited to agree that this is a suitable way forward for engagement and to suggest any further opportunities for engagement with delivery organisations.

### Aberdeen Pilot - Update

### 1. Background

The Scottish Government is funding a six month pilot (September 2017 to February 2018) in Aberdeen to explore options for providing access to free sanitary products for people from low income households and for students at school, college and university in ways that provide choice and respect dignity. The pilot aims are to:

- I. Test different approaches to providing dignified access to free sanitary products
- II. Provide indicative information on volume, type and quality of products required in the different settings, and costs
- III. Provide indicative information on the circumstances people are in that mean they cannot access sanitary products or have anxiety about being unable to access products, the impacts of lack of access to products and how people cope without the products they need.
- IV. Assess the impact of providing access to free sanitary products on beneficiaries.
- V. Assess the wider impact of providing access to free sanitary products on the organisations involved.

The pilot is being run by Community Food Initiatives North East (CFINE) and is providing access to a range of different types of sanitary products using established relationships with local partners through the FareShare surplus food network. It was initially rolled out with 5 community/third sector partner organisations and in 7 regeneration areas. Then in Robert Gordon's University (RGU), North East College Scotland (NESCol) and 3 secondary schools.

The pilot is being evaluated by a research team in Communities Analysis Division, with support from two experienced independent advisors. More information about the evaluation aims and methods can be found in the Evaluation Plan.

### 2. Uptake of the pilot offer

For the purpose of the pilot, participants are asked to 'sign up' to participate (rather than e.g. take products anonymously from an allocated location). This is to enable data to be collected about uptake and participants.

- As of **9**<sup>th</sup> **January**, around **700** beneficiaries have signed up to take part in the pilot: around 150 via CFINE, 340 via the other community/third sector partners, 45 at RGU, 90 at NESCol and 75 at the three schools.
- Partners initially offered products, then were given the option of offering a pre-paid card in December. Initial data suggest the pre-paid card option has proved popular where it has been offered (at this stage this data relates to low income women only). Additionally, to date more beneficiaries have opted for towels than tampons.

### 3. Arrangements and progress in each organisation

### 3.1. Community/third sector partners

Delivery started between August and September 2017. Methods for advertising the pilot, signing up beneficiaries and distributing products vary depending on how the organisation works with clients. Promotion of the pilot has included: posters; social media; mentioning the pilot to clients when they come in/use the service; promoting the pilot to groups within the organisation; and word of mouth.

In most community partners, sign up takes place in a private room and products are picked up from the same location. Other examples include: a worker taking products out with them on a visit to a family; products being included in a food parcel that is being collected; automatically distributing the same products as each beneficiary received initially.

### 3.2. <u>NESCol</u>

The Students' Association are leading on the pilot and delivery started in mid-September 2017. The SA advertise through all student email, social media, posters in toilets, and at their own notice board and desk. Students sign up at the SA's reception and collect the products they require at a designated pick-up point within the SA's central hub. They have a schedule of drop in sessions for signing up and collecting products.

### 3.3. RGU

The Students' Union are delivering provision. Delivery started in mid-September 2017. RGU promoted the pilot at Freshers Fair and via the SU's social media channels and in the SU. Students can sign up at the SU reception and access products from a designated collection area.

### 3.4. Schools

Three secondary schools are taking part in the pilot: two of the schools are in regeneration areas and one is not, to allow a comparison to be made. School assemblies are being used to promote the offer and further promotion is through Guidance staff and PSE classes. Delivery is a shared duty between Guidance staff and school nurses. One school is also making products available in the school toilets in baskets. A primary school has been added to the pilot more recently.

### 4. Early findings from the evaluation

- Most partners were aware of the issue of inadequate access to sanitary products and many organisations were already providing products in an ad hoc manner.
- It is clear that partner staff are very supportive of the initiative, but there are difficulties
  around prioritising the pilot within already very busy workloads.
- A key challenge has been raising awareness of the pilot. It is likely that the process for taking part in the pilot is having an impact on the number of beneficiaries – people are generally required to talk to someone and formally sign up.
- Several partners have reflected that there is some difficulty in broaching the topic of sanitary products as menstruation is still considered awkward to discuss. This has been observed to be particularly the case for younger people. Other feedback from partners on why some people may not be signing up includes: being on a type of contraception where they do not get periods or considering themselves financially able to pay for products.

### 5. Next steps in the evaluation

During the final stages of the evaluation, partners will continue recording information on sign up and products/cash/cards provided. Short interviews will be completed with a sample of partners to get their views on how the central coordination and delivery model worked, experiences discussing the issue with beneficiaries, what went well and challenges. Beneficiaries will be asked to complete another short questionnaire on their views of the pilot and a future scheme. Qualitative interviews or focus groups will be conducted with a sample of beneficiaries to explore their feelings about, and experiences of, accessing sanitary products and the pilot in more detail.



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

Happy New Year, I hope you have had a lovely Christmas and New Year.

Further to Nicola Sturgeon, First Ministers announcement in September 2017 in relation to tackling period poverty. The Council's Administration requested that Education Services to

introduce a 'pilot' in schools prior to Scottish Government funding being available from August 2018.

I have attached a copy of the committee report agreed at the Education Executive on 28 November 2017 to provide funding for the pilot, which will be aimed in the first instance at secondary schools.

Although the report refers to the 'installation of a vending machine to provide free sanitary products', this will now NOT be required as the Council have identified a social enterprise - 'Hey Girls' who will provide the products and publicity leaflets/posters to secondary schools at a minimal cost (but with no vending. 'Hey Girls' also provide free information/awareness sessions should schools wish to use this service.

The initial stock of products will be ordered centrally and delivered to each school direct from the supplier (by end January 2018). Thereafter, schools will be able to re-order as required (chargeable to a central cost centre).

Therefore, I would be grateful if you could determine, following consultation with your Pupil Council where the stock of products will be held within your school for pupils to access when stock is provided.

### D. TERMS OF REPORT

### D1 Introduction

It is now widely recognised that 'period poverty' is a growing issue whereby girls and women across Scotland are struggling to afford sanitary products and are using unsuitable items instead. There is evidence to suggest that across the country some young people are even avoiding school during their monthly cycle to avoid any potential embarrassment.

Following an audit of provision, it has been established that although the majority of West Lothian schools do currently provide free sanitary products to pupils the provision is not consistent. It was identified that schools generally hold supplies of sanitary products for pupils who ask for them in the school office, pupil support and/or guidance office.

Sanitary products are provided by schools using their devolved budget in emergency situations as required. However, pupils are not charged for the sanitary products provided.

### D2 Proposal

Research has been undertaken with other local authorities such as North Lanarkshire Council and North Ayrshire Council who have recently introduced initiatives to tackle 'period poverty' across secondary schools. Both have advised of the positive reception from schools, but as both have only recently been introduced it is too early to draw evidence based conclusions.

Within West Lothian, it is proposed that a pilot scheme is established to provide free sanitary product dispensing machines within the 11 secondary schools, with funding for a stock of sanitary products at primary and additional support needs schools in 2017/18.

It is proposed that a budget of £16,000 be allocated to the pilot project. The budget allocation will provide funds to install a vending machine providing free sanitary products within each of the eleven secondary schools. The location of the vending machines in each secondary school will be determined following consultation with the Pupil Council at the school. This will provide an opportunity to young people to express their views in relation to this very personal issue.

A stock of free sanitary products will be provided to primary and additional support needs schools based on pupil roll to be provided to pupils on request.

The uptake and effectiveness of the pilot will be monitored over the term of the pilot, which will also provide an opportunity to continue research and consultation with other local authorities, the third sector and other groups.

### E. CONCLUSION

The proposal to introduce a pilot to provide free sanitary products across West Lothian schools will support the Council's commitment to tackle poverty in communities and build a better future for our young people.

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# Response to the Consultation on the Proposed Sanitary Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Bill – December 2017

### Introduction

Colleges Scotland is the collective voice for the college sector in Scotland, representing its interests with the aim that colleges are at the heart of a word class education sector that is recognised, valued and available to all. Colleges Scotland, as the membership body, represents all 26 colleges, which deliver both further education and around 28% of all higher education in Scotland.

We welcome the opportunity to respond to the consultation on the Proposed Sanitary Products (Free Provision) (Scotland) Bill. Our response is set out below.

### Aim and approach

1. Which of the following best expresses your view of the proposed Bill?

Fully supportive.

Please explain the reasons for your response.

Colleges Scotland is supportive of the proposal to ensure those on low incomes who menstruate, are able to access sanitary products in a way which protects their dignity and health.

### Universal provision of sanitary products

2. Do you think a universal, card-based system (modelled on the C-card system for free condoms) would be an effective means of providing sanitary products for free to those who need them?

Yes.

### Please explain the reasons for your response.

Colleges Scotland is mindful of the Programme for Government commitment for schools, colleges and universities to provide free sanitary products for pupils and students on low incomes, and has already been examining how this commitment could be delivered. The mechanism of delivery requires careful consideration, especially given the relatively low proportion of an individual's time which is spent in school, college or university – a reality which is heightened for those who undertake study which requires significant time outside of the institution, including those on placement, distance learners and those undertaking work-based learning.

A system modelled on the C-card scheme could allow for schools, colleges and universities to act as partners in a broader scheme, whilst protecting access to sanitary products for individuals outside of their institution contact time.

### 3. Which of the following best expresses your view in relation to a card-based system?

The card should be available only to those on low incomes or in receipt of benefits; card holders should have unlimited access to free sanitary products.

### Please explain the reasons for your response.

Colleges Scotland does not have policy on this question, however, as other elements of student support are subject to means-testing our belief is that it would be appropriate to similarly implement this policy. Colleges have funds to distribute to students facing hardship, and it may be feasible to include registering eligible students for such a scheme at the same time as dispensing discretionary funding.

4. Do you have a view on which locations would be most suitable for dispensing free sanitary products (e.g. GP surgeries, pharmacies, community centres, health clinics)?

Colleges Scotland has consulted with college principals, who are supportive of colleges dispensing free sanitary products. Mindful of our response to question 2, we would suggest that alternative locations should be brought into a dispensing network to ensure that those entitled to free sanitary provision are able to access these items outside of their contact time with their college.

### Schools, colleges and universities

5. Do you agree that there should be specific obligations on schools, colleges and universities to make sanitary products available for free (via dispensers in toilets)?

### Please explain the reasons for your response.

This proposal seems to be a micro-level consideration. Should colleges be obliged to make sanitary products available for free, it should be for colleges to establish how best to do that. Many colleges have procured contracts for dispensing machines and products which may have costs for changing or breaking the contract, which would not be an effective use of public money. In the interim, proposals which allowed the institution to make sanitary products available in a manner which suits the college (for example, some colleges may choose to have a basket of products available in bathrooms) would provide a level of flexibility to ensure that students have their needs met quickly.

### (d) Individuals (including consumers of sanitary products)

### Please explain the reasons for your response.

The evidence around lost days of work and study would suggest that implementing this policy may reduce these, which would be a net gain for productivity so would have broadly cost-neutral financial implications for businesses. For the Scottish Government and public-sector bodies, which includes both schools and colleges, the cost implication would be higher in the introductory phase as the delivery mechanism is agreed and rolled out – for example, in purchasing machines which dispense freely, or in seeing out/ending contracts for delivery. Colleges Scotland would expect to see such a commitment funded by the Scottish Government, and would advocate for a model which is not reliant on delivery from core budgets. On an individual level, we would expect to see some reduction in costs, particularly for those on low incomes who are able to make use of free sanitary provision.

9. Are there ways in which the Bill could achieve its aim more cost effectively (e.g. by reducing costs or increasing savings)?

The Bill should propose a costing exercise to establish whether having sanitary products procured nationally would reduce the cost per item of sanitary products (including mooncups) and dispensing machines. It is worth noting that the National Union of Students owns and operates a purchasing consortium which all colleges in Scotland, and all higher education institutions, excluding Glasgow University, St Andrews University, Glasgow School of Art and Dundee University, are able to access.

### **Equalities**

10. What overall impact is the proposed Bill likely to have on equality, taking account of the following protected characteristics (under the Equality Act 2010): age, disability, gender re-assignment, marriage and civil partnership, pregnancy and maternity, race, religion and belief, sex, sexual orientation?

Positive.

### Please explain the reasons for your response.

The consultation takes care to note the specific need of individuals with gender identities which are not aligned with their sex as assigned at birth; this should be carried through into the final Bill. This represents an opportunity for a progressive and forward-thinking Bill, so it may be prudent to consult with organisations in Scotland who support Trans people in the drafting stage.

The Bill is likely to have a positive effect on females, in reducing the financial burden related to menstruation, especially for those who have to make the very real choice to prioritise purchasing sanitary protection over other essentials.

11. In what ways could any negative impact of the Bill on equality be minimised or avoided?

Ensure that drafting of the Bill is done in consultation and partnership with women's organisations.

### Sustainability

12. Do you consider that the proposed bill can be delivered sustainably, i.e. without having likely future disproportionate economic, social and/or environmental impacts?

Unsure.

### Please explain the reasons for your response.

These proposals focus on disposable tampons and sanitary towels. Consideration should be given as to whether the proposed Bill could positively impact on consumer knowledge of, and attitudes to, alternative products such as washable reusable towels, mooncups, period pants and other innovative products.

1.	<b>Welcome/introductions</b> Shirley Laing (SL) welcomed the Group, followed by round-table introductions.	
2.	Purpose SL confirmed that the purpose of the Working Group was to support the implementation and delivery of the Programme for Government commitment to provide access to free sanitary products in schools, colleges and universities and to consider further action following the completion of the Aberdeen pilot.  To give further background and context, SL noted the proposed Private Members Bill from Monica Lennon MSP which would place duties on local authorities (LAs), colleges and universities to provide free sanitary products, and on Scottish Ministers to implement universal access.  SL also highlighted the significant media interest in the "period poverty" campaign.	
3.	Terms of Reference spoke to this item. There was broad agreement from the Group on the Terms of Reference.	

The following additional Group memberships were suggested: suppliers
of sanitary products, a representative for young people, such as the
Scottish Youth Parliament or Children's Commissioner, and from the
transgender network
transgender colleagues and that other relevant interests would be
consulted as required as the work develops. It was therefore agreed that
core members were already in place.
his team has previously worked closely with the Children's Commissioner
and could lend the benefit of that experience.

A discussion followed on what dignified provision might look like and whether providing access through dispensers would achieve this, particularly in schools. Confirmed that SG is not proposing a prescriptive approach; rather, it would be for local partners to agree local delivery arrangements, ensuring alignment with the policy principles (which would be agreed by the working group). Scottish Government also highlighted the small-scale local activity already underway in response to the issue e.g. schools in North Ayrshire and North Lanarkshire and South Lanarkshire College and the opportunity to learn from and build on these. Early indications are that local approaches will be the most effective way forward. Additionally, noted that the pilot scheme in Aberdeen will provide feedback from students on different approaches.

On timescales, SL noted that the First Minister stated at SNP Conference that the commitment "will be delivered from the start of the new academic year next August." SL acknowledged the challenging nature of the timescales around that commitment – whilst the Scottish Government ambition and aspiration is 100% coverage by August 2018 there is recognition that this is dependent on local circumstances and infrastructure hence the need for information and support from working group members to identify the current position, local delivery trajectories, and any issues or obstacles which either working group partners or Scottish Government can help remove. Such information will inform whether full coverage is achievable by August 2018, and if not will provide us with a clear understanding of what is achievable and when 100% coverage will happen.

### 4. Policy Requirements

There was some discussion about which schools should be in scope of the commitment; suggested that existing funding arrangements for schools offered an established model.

- some 2,500 LA-administered schools funded by SG via the block grant to COSLA;
- around 10 grant-aided schools funded by SG to provide special education services;
- Jordanhill School, which is wholly funded by SG; and
- approximately 100 independent schools that receive no SG funding.

SL confirmed that early thinking is that the PfG commitment relates to to those schools currently funded by SG (so independent schools would confirm info likely be out of scope), but that the Empowering Schools Unit would on SG grant investigate and report back to the working group. From the group funded discussion the general view was primary schools should be in scope. SL schools. stated further work will be done on all of this and flagged that final decisions on scope would be a matter for Ministers informed by working group thinking. Engagement Approach & Galvanising Action SL noted the importance of a collaborative approach across the sectors to ensure the necessary arrangements are in place to facilitate delivery from August 2018. She indicated that the Cabinet Secretary for Communities, Social Security and Equalities would hold a meeting with key stakeholders soon after autumn recess - COSLA, Scottish Funding Council, Colleges Scotland and Universities Scotland - to galvanise their support both at leadership level, and with practical support to mobilise their respective sectors. Ms Constance would also write to sector leaders in LAs, colleges and universities setting out her expectations and seeking their support and action to make the commitment a reality. Directors of Education, College Principals and University Secretaries were identified as the appropriate leaders. Reflecting on the positive pre-meet Social Justice colleagues had with the SFC, SL asked that COSLA and Universities Scotland also support SG by gathering information, specifically in relation to local implementation plans. COSLA and US confirmed their support. cautioning the need for Scottish Government to be precise and proportionate about the information requested. 		CoSLA officials advised their Board had welcomed the fact that SG was not limiting the offer to in-school hours in term-time and also that primary age girls were being included (pro-rata) in the funding calculations.

		SG officials updated on the position that would be communicated at the working group and asked for feedback. This issue was discussed at the Colleges Principals group in October and they felt that this could probably be introduced without too many cost implications. They welcome the gender neutral policy.
		It has however been difficult to get Principals to assign someone to take the lead on this. SAs have been the ones campaigning but they are not in a position to negotiate overall provision. Colleges Scotland does now have a list of leads – roughly half from student services and half from facilities management.
		There is a meeting planned for 7 Feb to discuss this. Colleges Scotland is not concerned about timescales as they've agreed to make this happen.
		We discussed out of hours provision and she felt that colleges would probably need to be able to access a national solution – there are also issues around UHI which is very dispersed with 13 partners, mostly colleges (colleges deliver FE and the Uni delivers HE). There are 40 localities.

		They have bought a significant stock from Hey Girls at £1.50 for a pack of 10, so with the 'get one free' the actual cost is 75p per pack (7.5p per product). Initial stock will be in schools by the end of the month and then schools will order additional supplies directly through PeCOS. There has been no complaint from schools around this way of ordering. They have agreed to pay for a maximum of 150 cartons which equates to 67,500 products (at a cost of just over £5k).
		Each school is going to work with their pupil council to agree a location where the pads will be held so that they are easily accessible eg pupil support base, medical room, office. To allow these conversations to happen it is expected that the pilot will officially commence on 1st March.
