28 reports published to date


We have:

- spoken with around 1500 parents and carers











Critical issues

- Relationship between chief officers and CPCs

Relationships in high performing areas

- There are strong, supportive, respectful and appropriately challenging relationships between the chairs and lead officers of the different public protection committees/structures (child protection; adult support and protection; domestic abuse forum; alcohol and drugs partnership)
- The chief social work officer is able to represent a strong voice for children and has respect and credibility with chief officers, CPC chair and key decision makers.
