SRDP progress/RDOC update

Introduction

- The Rural Development Operational Committee (RDOC), which forms part of the SRDP programme governance structure, met on the 25th April. Papers tabled at the RDOC meeting are available on the website: http://www.gov.scot/Topics/farmingrural/SRDP/SRDP2014-2020RDOC
- 2. The JMPC are invited to provide comments on the progress of the SRDP, including the risk register, progress towards the performance reserve and the Scottish Rural Network work programme which are attached as annexes.
- 3. The JPMC are also invited to note that the annual implementation report (AIR) is due to be submitted by 30 June 2018. We will seek the views of the JPMC on the AIR via email correspondence in advance of submission.

SRDP progress

- 4. The programme continues to progress well in delivery of funds, to date the programme has approved over 10,000 applications, along with supporting around 11,300 farmers and crofters each year through the Less Favoured Area Support Scheme (LFASS). This totals nearly £760m of new agreements, out of a total budget of £1.26bn.
- 5. There continues to be consistent demand for the majority of schemes, with particularly high demand for new entrants and young farmers to agriculture and also demand for grants for food processing cooperation and marketing. As reported at the last JPMC, there is less activity under the SRDP Broadband due to the roll out of the R100 intiative.
- 6. Modification 4 was approved in February 2018. Modification 5 will be progressed Autumn 2018.
- 7. The risk register is attached at Annex A.

Budgets

- 8. SRDP indicative scheme budgets were revised in 2017, we will continue to monitor scheme performance and demand and the budgets are likely to change again in the future.
- 9. Forward planning in 2017 to adjust the SRDP scheme budgets has meant that there were no shocks to the SRDP for the 2018/19 SG budget.

- 10. However, as majority of budget is committed and with on-going pressures on SG budgets, there is less flexibility for remainder of programme. The SG 2019/20 draft budget due to be published by the end of the year.
- 11. SG is closely monitoring progress towards the performance reserve, Annex B shows progress at the end of 2017. We are on track for most of our targets and closely monitoring those where we still have some progress to make. We are in discussion with the Commission about the potential to use 'committed' spend rather than actual spend in certain instances.

EU exit/future policy

- 12. There continues to be concern about the impact of Brexit and funding guarantees on the SRDP. SRDP projects are guaranteed where contracts are entered into before an UK exit from the EU and LFASS for 2019. There is a pledge to maintain the budget for 'farm support' until the end of the current UK Parliament, however it is not clear what counts as 'farm support'. Ministers continue to push for all Pillar 2 (and Pillar 1) to be guaranteed in full.
- 13. Work is underway to consider future policy priorities through the Agriculture Champions, whose final report will be published by the summer, and the National Council of Rural Advisors (which includes the Ag Champions) published its interim report into the potential implications for rural Scotland of the UK leaving the EU on the 29 Nov 2017. They intend to undertake stakeholder engagement before publishing their final report.
- 14. A stocktake of monitoring and evaluation across the SRDP is underway to establish evidence, and gaps, for future policy. Officials are also monitoring EU progress with the future Common Agricultural Policy.

Purpose of paper


- 1. To provide members of the RDOC with an overview of the draft work programme for the Scottish Rural Network (SRN); and
- 2. To invite members of the RDOC to provide comments/feedback on the draft work programme.

Background

The Scottish Rural Network (SRN) is funded under the SRDP Technical Assistance budget and has the following aims, as required by EU Regulations:

- Increase the involvement of stakeholders in the implementation of rural development;
- Improve the quality of implementation of the rural development programme;
- Inform the broader public and potential beneficiaries on rural development policy and funding opportunities;
- Foster innovation in agriculture, food production, forestry and rural areas.

The SRN has an Action Plan for 2014-20, which the RDOC has seen. The Action Plan sets out the purpose, governance, planning and delivery arrangements for the SRN. The 2018/19 Work Programme sits underneath the Action Plan and sets out the activities the SRN will deliver from 1st April 2018 to 31st March 2019.



The work programme is supported by a communication plan and a monitoring and

evaluation plan. It also forms a vital part of the SRDP Annual Communication Strategy, with a single activity planner that sits across the SRN and all the SRDP schemes.

Development of work programme

SRN activities are driven by both the legal requirements and by stakeholder needs. It is informed by a wide range of events, workshops and meetings the SRN has delivered over the last two years, as well as an annual online stakeholder survey. Priorities for 2018/19 Work Programme

Key priorities for the SRN this year include:

- The SRN will also maintain a number of regular, on-going activities including: Successful delivery of the annual OECD conference in April 2018 with follow up actions and output delivered upon
- Support and delivery a successful Rural Parliament event in partnership with SRA
- Support the new 'Innovation Support Service', aimed at increasing collaborative innovation in the agricultural, food and drink, and forestry sectors
- Analysis outputs of the NCRA report due in late May/early June 2018, identifying any
 outputs that SRN should support and provide support for any follow up activity e.g. event
 management of workshops and events (including "significant event" at the Royal Highland
 Show)
- Deliver a series of rural 'themed' events (detail and timing of these events still to be developed but will include a Rural Transport forum event)
- Increase the number of project case studies available on the SRN website to include examples from the majority of the SRDP schemes.
- Undertake a major review of the current SRN website with a view to improving navigation and increasing traffic
- Improve coordination of communications across the SRDP
- Establish a new LEADER Evaluation working group
- Pilot co-operation learning session in Moray and roll out to all 21 LAG's to support the ongoing development of cooperation projects, particularly to help increase the number of LEADER cooperation projects coming forward to apply
- Produce three short films to demonstrate the impact of SRDP funding and to promote and encourage rural development

The SRN will also maintain a number of regular, on-going activities including:

- Producing a weekly e-newsletter to more than 1,200 subscribers.
- Maintenance of SRN website and social media feeds.
- Building relationships with and between key stakeholders.
- Collating and issuing a monthly LEADER newsletter to more than 220 subscribers

In line with the Aims and Objectives of the 2018 Year of Young People, the Scottish Rural Network and the Network Support Unit will also actively seek to work in partnership with other partners, including (but not limited to) local authorities, education institutes, youth organisations and young people themselves to ensure young people have a platform to have their views heard and acted upon, and that they will have a key role in the development and delivery of activities ensuring an inclusive approach is taken throughout the Year and beyond, creating a lasting legacy
