Introduction

- 1. The public sector equality duties on race, disability and gender require that equality considerations are integrated into all the functions and policies of Scottish Government Directorates and Agencies.
- 2. A key part of these duties is to impact assess all of our policies to ensure that we do not inadvertently create a negative impact for equality groups. It is the Scottish Government's policy that the equality groups we consider extends beyond those three areas covered by a public sector equality duty and includes the six equality strands of age, disability, gender, race, lesbian, gay, bisexual and transgender, and religion and belief.

Screening

Policy Aim

- 5. The National Marine Plan is intended to help ensure Scotland's seas are developed in a sustainable manner. Its purpose is to provide a framework for managing increasing demands for the use of our marine environment, encouraging economic development of marine industries and incorporating environmental protection into marine decision making. It will provide clarity for marine decision making thus creating an environment of certainty for marine investment, such as renewables, while ensuring appropriate environmental protection is achieved.
- 6. In meeting these goals, the National Marine Plan will contribute towards the Scottish Government's Purpose. The Purpose, as explained in the Government Economic Strategy, is to create a more successful country with opportunities for all of Scotland to flourish through increasing sustainable economic growth. It will also contribute to the following National Outcomes:
 - We realise our full economic potential with more and better employment opportunities for our own people.
 - We live in a Scotland that is the most attractive place for doing business in Europe.
 - We live in well-designed, sustainable places where we are able to access the amenities and services we need.
 - We have strong, resilient and supportive communities where people take responsibility for their own actions and how they affect others.
 - We value and enjoy our built and natural environment and protect it and enhance it for future generations.
 - We reduce the local and global environmental impact of our consumption and production.
- 7. In meeting its goals, the National Marine Plan will also support the Scottish Government's vision for the marine environment: clean, healthy, safe, productive and biologically diverse oceans and seas, managed to meet the long term needs of nature and people.

Who will it affect?

- 8. The National Marine Plan (NMP) may affect a diversity of people with an interest in the marine environment in Scotland's seas. The NMP sets out planning policies to inform and guide marine users and developers on how marine resources should be used/managed/located etc. As such marine planning policies will have implications on:
- The preparing of and consultation on marine plans by marine planning authorities;
- The preparation of applications by developers and assessment of these applications by marine licensing authorities and other decision makers;
- The choice of location of marine developments and activities; and
- The requirements placed on the construction, operation and expansion of marine developments.

A number of sectors/groups of people will be affected by the adoption of a National Marine Plan including:

- Marine activities/businesses: oil and gas, renewable energy, ports & harbours, aquaculture, aggregates and coastal defence.
- Developers of licensed activities in Scotland's Marine Area (all such activities listed above.
- Activities in Scotland's Marine Area that do not require licences or that have licences that do not have a spatial component to them (including fishing, shipping, tourism, leisure and recreational activities.
- Marine nature conservation, coastal defence, and marine heritage activities/conservation.
- Coastal communities
- The Scottish Government (through Marine Scotland's Planning and Licensing functions)
- Local Planning Authorities
- The Crown Estate
- Regional Marine Planning Partnerships (including Local Authorities)
- The Ministry of Defence

Marine activities have the potential to affect these groups in many ways. For example, coastal communities may benefit economically and socially from the success of coastal and marine economies in their area; such as fishing, port infrastructure or tourism. Similarly, communities can suffer high levels of social and economic deprivation as a result of industrial decline. Coastal communities may benefit from improved coastal recreation opportunities and environmental improvements whereas they may suffer from possible adverse effects of marine air quality, visual intrusion, coastal erosion and flood risk.

These effects may impact equalities target groups embedded within these communities both positively and potentially negatively. However, at the scale of the National Marine Plan there is no clear differentiation between the potential effects upon target groups and non-target groups.

What might prevent the desired outcomes being achieved?

- 9. The main aim of the National Marine Plan is to manage the competing demands for use of marine resources and support sustainable development of Scotland's seas.
- 10. The key challenge for the National Marine Plan will be supporting economic growth of marine industries and activities whilst ensuring growth occurs in balance with the protection of the marine environment and historic heritage.
- 11. The National Marine Plan embodies a sustainable approach to planning, development and use of the marine area. The NMP promotes the presumption in favour sustainable development and use, along with other

policies which are considered important in achieving a sustainable approach to sustainable economic growth.

Stage 1: Framing

Results of framing exercise

- 12. The preparation of the NMP is being accompanied by a Sustainability Appraisal (SA) which includes a Strategic Environmental Assessment (SEA), this report has been published for consultation alongside the NMP. The framing exercise has been informed by workshops held with key stakeholders and officials in 2011 to consult on the Sustainability Appraisal scoping report and assess marine planning policies. These workshops were used to identify potential equality impacts posed by the NMP and the potential scope of influence i.e. to determine whether a full EQIA assessment is required.
- 13. A pre-consultation of the draft National Marine Plan was held from 15 March 2011 to 07 June 2011. This consultation received 77 responses from a wide range of marine sectors and stakeholders. The consultation included the equality question: "Do you believe that the creation of a Scottish National Marine Plan discriminates disproportionately between persons defined by age, disability, sexual orientation, gender, race and religion and belief?"; a supplementary question allowed respondees to expand if answered 'yes'.

 Table 1 summarises the various groups responding to this consultation.

14. The analysis of responses to the pre-consultation draft NMP did not indicate that the National Marine Plan will have a potential impact on groups of people who share the relevant protected characteristics.

Extent/Level of EQIA required

15. It was determined as part of the framing exercise that a light touch assessment will be taken with this EQIA as current evidence shows that the NMP has insignificant potential impacts and minimal relevance to equality. However, further evidence is required on the views of people potentially affected by NMP across all protected characteristics.

Further evidence gathering and engagement will take place as part of the consultation on the NMP. The following questions are contained in the Respondent Information Form that will be used to record responses to the consultation:

Q38. Do you believe that the creation of a Scottish National Marine Plan discriminates disproportionately between persons defined by age, disability, sexual orientation, gender, race and religion and belief?

Q39. If you answered yes to question 38, in what way do you believe that the creation of a Scottish National Marine Plan is discriminatory?
