

2:1	<ul> <li>Please give an update on the progress your project has made during the reporting period. (Max 500 words)</li> <li>The project has progressed well during the first six months, enrolment in primary school has increased by 4% for boys and 5% for girls, exceeding our impact indicator targets of an 1.5% increase. An additional 1,686 children have enrolled in the 27 primary schools. This project is providing a daily meal to 28,441 (13,617 girls and 14,824 boys) primary-aged children in Zomba.</li> </ul>
	Enrolment in ECD's has increased by a remarkable 23% during the reporting period, also exceeding our impact indicator targets. An additional 419 children under-6 have enrolled in ECD centres. The project is providing school meals to 2,233 children in 34 ECD centres (1,176 girls and 1,814 boys).
	This highlights the effectiveness of school feeding in attracting more children into the classroom. The project is now supporting 30,674 children in Zomba.
	We have also exceeded our targets for several other indicators. For example, our target related to feeding rate – the number of days on which school feeding is delivered as planned – reflects that we aim to maintain a rate of 90% throughout the programme. We have exceeded this target and achieved a 93% feeding rate overall in the first six months.
	The community training sessions that have taken place during the report period - which have been delivered to a total of 1,803 participants – is helping foster strong partnerships with the local communities where our school feeding takes place. The training sessions are helping ensure all those involved in the programme clearly understand their roles and responsibilities and encourage

	participants to apply best practice and to take an active role in ensuring that the programme activities are being implemented to a high standard. Importantly, these trainings promote community ownership which is an integral aspect of our programme.		
	Sustainability activities have also been a focus during the first 6 months. Communities have been trained in woodlot management and over 6,000 seedlings have been planted. Survival rate of trees are above targeted rates for milestone 1, which falls during the rainy season.		
	Overall the project is on track to meet milestones and targets, the attendance rate for both boys' and girls' is 84% in primary schools and 66% in ECD's- which is lower than anticipated. There are many external factors that influence attendance rate- a common example during the rainy season is adverse weather affecting children being able to reach school as roads are flooded. Whilst partially achieving the intended milestone, it is encouraging to see such a high percentage attendance rate at this time of year, especially given recent flooding in Zomba.		
	Overall, the project has progressed very well within its first six months. Every school and ECD has an active school feeding committee, and schools and communities are extremely supportive of the programme. School feeding is consistently delivered to a high standard, and community trainings and local level governmental capacity building meetings are all on track. The programme is well supported by local government and communities alike throughout Zomba.

	Yes. The only baseline yet to be completed is Outcome 1 Indicator 2 which relates to the number of children graduating from ECD centres. Data on this indicator will become available at the end of the academic year, at which point the logframe will be updated.

	Severe flooding occurred across southern Malawi in March 2019. Thankfully, our team in Malawi have confirmed that feeding and learning was not disrupted at any of the 27 primary schools and 34 ECD centres supported by this grant, which demonstrates the hard work and dedication of schools, communities and Mary's Meals' staff		

	to support local communities and our local partner; who is responsible for the ECD buildings, to recover from the flooding. At this time of great need, Mary's Meals' school				
	feeding programme continues to deliver a crucial meal to children meeting their immediate hunger needs and encouraging them to continue attending school even in especially difficult times. The programme provides a social safety net for families struggling to t enough food in this time of need. Mary's Meals has been support over 17,000 people with food aid as part of our emergency respon following the flooding.

Indicator 3 Increased attendance in 27	Milestone Primary: Boys: 88% Girls: 89% Pre-schools: 77% boys and girls.	Partially achieved: attendance across primary schools is 84% for both boys and girls. At pre- schools the attendance rate is 66%. There are many external factors that influence attendance rate- a common example during the rainy season is adverse weather affecting children being able to reach school as roads are flooded. Whilst partially achieving the intended milestone, it is encouraging to see such a high percentage attendance rate at this time of year, especially given recent flooding in Zomba. It is worth noting that throughout the reporting period 7 schools had attendance rates over 95% which demonstrates the willingness of children to attend school each day.
Outcome Indicator 4 Percentage of teachers reporting improved primary school test results following introduction of school meals.		98% of the 48 teachers surveyed reported improved primary school test results, of which 71% said grades have improved and 27% said grades have improved a lot. This shows the immediate impact that our school feeding programme is having on children's ability to concentrate and learn in class. NB: This is an encouragingly high result. To maintain a

			realistic approach our milestones will remain unchanged.

		Primary: 27 Committees Pre-schools: 34 Committees	Active school feeding committees have been established at all primary schools and ECD centres involved in this programme. These committees are responsible for the daily management of the school feeding programme at the school level. They ensure the community ownership remains at the heart of the programme and provide a close link between Mary's Meals staff and the volunteers that prepare and serve our school meals. Committees are made of at least 10 members, 5 women and 5 men, ensuring an equal and inclusive approach to decision making.
